# MUSI 1115: Jazz Ensemble

The preparation, study, and performance of large jazz ensemble music, representing a spectrum of styles and periods, as a means to provide understanding of the genre's historical, social and cultural contexts. CA1.

**Credits:** One credit each semester. Two laboratory periods. May be repeated for credit.

**Rehearsal schedule:** Tuesdays and Thursdays, 2:00 – 3:45 P.M. VDM Classes will meet synchronously via Zoom for the first 2 weeks, or until directed by the university. Students are expected to be in class during the assigned class time, and having cameras on will be much appreciated. In order to reduce background noise, microphones should remain muted until called upon.

Jazz ensembles at the University of Connecticut are open to students from all concentrations within the university who demonstrate the requisite instrumental skill in their audition.

By studying, preparing, and performing repertoire that represents the wide spectrum of jazz styles and eras, the UConn jazz ensembles pay homage to the rich big band tradition. The exact instrumentation, number of class sections, and programmatic concert themes vary from semester to semester, based on enrollment numbers, faculty resources and providing thematic diversification. The ensembles frequently focus on the music of a specific composer, arranger, or professional band, for a semester. Afro-Latin jazz, exploring the intersection of music from Africa, Cuba, Brazil, and the Caribbean is amongst the continuous rotation of repertoire. Additionally, new works composed and/or arranged by UCONN faculty, alumni and students are periodically programmed, thereby providing students with the opportunity to interact with a composer in the process of realizing their artistic vision. All selected repertoires will serve as a vehicle for teaching stylistic nuance, while cultivating an awareness of the music's historical, social, and cultural significance and contexts. Public engagement is accomplished through providing concerts and workshops at high schools, educational jazz festivals, and music education conferences throughout New England.

#### Within these large jazz ensembles, the students will...

- be exposed to a variety of jazz repertoire and be able to place it into historical, social, and cultural contexts.
- recognize and understand how jazz has amalgamated with other culturally expressive styles, morphing into new subgenres (Afro-Cuban Latin Jazz, Jazz-Rock fusion, Third Stream, contemporary composition, etc.)
- identify the stylistic nuances of various jazz styles, through the analysis of audio recordings, videos and in-person demonstrations.
- develop proficiency in interpreting notated jazz ensemble music, including sight-reading.
- build skills in jazz improvisation and spontaneous musical interaction, as an alternative means of musical expression to Western musical notation practices.
- improve their ability to sonically blend within their section and across sections of the ensemble (e.g., saxophone with trumpet).
- cultivate self-reflection practices through critiquing and assessing their personal and group performance in rehearsals and concerts.
- present exciting, well-programmed concerts of the highest caliber.

## Grading:

- Rehearsal preparedness, participation, and professionalism: **30%** 
  - For all rehearsals and performances, students are expected to: have practiced & prepared the assigned music (including listening to pre existing recordings, if applicable), be in attendance and on time, bring the necessary equipment, and act responsibly & professionally.
- Recorded mastery appraisals and reflection: **20%**

- Students will submit 2 video recordings of their sectional rehearsals. Each section will designate one member to submit the video via HuskyCT.
- Video submission requirements: each video should contain 20 minutes of playing, and 10 minutes of reflection on individual/section artistic growth in relation to the specific music, period, style, and composer(s) under current preparation. Each student must contribute to the dialogue within the 10 minute time frame.
- Due dates: TBD as per sectional rehearsal dates
- Written Reflection: **15%** 
  - A one-page post-concert written reflection will be submitted by each student addressing shortcomings, as well as favorable attributes and outcomes, individually, as a section, and as an ensemble.
  - Due date: Wednesday, April 6
- Listening assignment: **10%** 
  - Students will listen to a recording to be specified by the instructor. A questionnaire form (on HuskyCT) will be completed to convey what was heard and how it relates to common day artistic jazz
  - Due date: Monday, February 7
- Performances: 25%
  - Concerts serve as a principal means for judging musical development, progression, and accomplishment within the ensemble.

#### Jazz Ensemble Rehearsal & Performance Policies

1. Students must be in attendance, on time, and prepared for all rehearsals and performances. A HuskyCT announcement will be sent every Friday to let students know what to prepare for rehearsals the following week. If sickness or an emergency requires that the student be absent from a rehearsal, the student must arrange for a substitute. It is the student's responsibility to notify the instructor in advance and get the music to the substitute. It is also the responsibility of the student to get his/her music back from the substitute for the next rehearsal. Failure to provide the substitute with the music for rehearsal, or failure to get the

music back for the next rehearsal may result in the lowering of the student's final grade. A text message should be left at least one hour prior to the rehearsal at (203) 494-0358. An unexcused absence will result in the lowering of the student's grade. Students with three unexcused absences will be immediately dropped from the class and assigned an "F" for the semester. Only the instructor may determine what constitutes an "excused absence". Repeated tardiness will result in a lowering of the student's final grade.

2. Performances scheduled after the semester begins will be mandatory for the student if no objection is raised at the time of the query. Any student who misses a performance without permission in advance from the instructor will be immediately dropped from the class and assigned an "F" for the semester.

3. No food or drink (except water) is allowed in the rehearsal room.

4. Cell phones are to be turned off and not used during rehearsals and performances. No digital distractions please!

5. Any music handed out to students during the semester is the sole responsibility of that student. Failure to return any music to the jazz department that was handed out during the year will require the student to pay for replacement of the missing music. When music is no longer available from the publisher, students will submit a complete part transcribed from the score utilizing a music notation program (Finale, Sibelius, etc.) NO EXCEPTIONS! Grades will not be issued until all music is returned.

6. Students are expected to act responsibly and professionally at all rehearsals and performances. Concert attire is semi-formal: ties/coats for men. No tennis shoes, jeans, sunglasses, or hats. At NO TIME are students permitted to drink alcohol at/before a jazz rehearsal or performance.
